- 1. Pianocafé** | Wonderfully old-fashioned pastry shop with opulent cakes | Live piano music three afternoons a week | Neue Kantstraße 20
- 2. Hedwig-Rüdiger-Haus** | The engaged social reformer Hedwig Rüdiger financed the residence for single female postal and telegraph employees in the 1920s by organizing a club with share certificates | Dernburgstraße 58
- 3. Die ehemalige Oberpostdirektion** | The formidable four-wing postal service building was built 1925-28 | Dernburgstraße 44-52
- 4. Entrance to Kleingartenkolonie der Bahnländwirtschaft e.V.** | These garden plots stretch from the train tracks and the lanes of the A 100 | Dernburgstraße 35
- 5. Die Große Lietzensee-Kaskade am Dernburgplatz** | The fountain was commissioned in 1913 to help provide the lake with oxygenic water - one of the world's first water restoration projects | Dernburgplatz
- 6. Evangelische Kirche am Lietzensee** | A little gem tucked between the trees: built in 1957-59 this church is considered one of Berlin's most beautiful. A path leads up the hillside | Entrance at Herbartstraße 4-6
- 7. Ehemaliges Knappschaftshaus** | Originally an administrative building for the miner's professional association, it served as a registration office for refugees from the Soviet zone in the 1950s. Today it holds offices for the creative economy | Kuno-Fischer-Straße 8
- 8. Bootshaus Stella am Lietzensee** | A gorgeous location on the water looking out to the radio tower. The café serves pizza, snacks, and cake | Witzlebenplatz
- 9. Ehemaliges Reichskriegsgericht** | The courthouse was used from 1936 through 1942 as the highest military court. 1,400 death sentences were pronounced here during WWII. In 2006 the long-since empty space has been transformed into luxury apartments. A plaque outside the door reminds of the victims of the NS "justice" system | Witzlebenplatz 1-2
- 10. Engelbecken** | A lauded restaurant without any fluff: the unostentatious ambience complements the first-rate cuisine | Witzlebenstraße 31
- 11. St.-Canisius-Kirche** | The holy structure - two giant cubes of exposed concrete and larch wood - was inaugurated in 2002 and is worth the detour | Witzlebenstraße 27-29

MESSE NORD/ ICC WALK | Lietzensee - Green oasis in the city

The "Grüne Woche," Berlin's major food fair, lasts just a week, but Lietzensee and its accompanying park in the shadow of the Funkturm and opposite the futuristic hulk of the ICC, are open to the public year round. A quiet oasis not far from the Autobahn's passing lane.
