- 1. Original** | Rich facade decoration distinguishes the building | Ahornallee 47
- 2. Neighboring house of Villa Ibrox** | Neo-gothic miniature castle – it could serve as a wonderful backdrop in Edgar Wallace's films | Ulmenallee 3
- 3. Arkadien** | Villa in classic Schinkel style | Ulmenallee 17
- 4. House of architectural styles** | From late Gothic to Baroque, this facade has it all | Eichenallee 16-18
- 5. Renaissance castle** | This playful villa with a round tower and conical roof exhibits from French influences. Despite appearances, Walt Disney did not have this one contracted | Rüsternallee 18, corner of Kastanienallee
- 6. Bar Zur Haltestelle** | Family-owned for almost 50 years. The crowd is older and local, but newcomers are also welcome | Spandauer Damm 86
- 7. Plaster molding studio for Germany's national museums** | The largest still existing plaster molding studio in the world produces perfect reproductions with its 7,000 molds | Sophie-Charlotten-Straße 17-18
- 8. Church of the St. Kammilus Congregation** | Exceptional church from 1932 | Klausenerplatz 12-13
- 9. Mata Terraristik** | All sorts of animals creep and crawl throughout this store. Here visitors can confront their phobias | Gardes-du-Corps-Straße 5
- 10. Atelier Kunstlager** | Large display windows afford a glimpse into the dazzling world of image and light sculptures | Christstraße 29a
- 11. Ziegenhof** | Wildlife center for kids with metropolitan goats, geese, chickens and ducks | Danckelmannstraße 16
- 12. Bar Dicker Wirt** | Eight different well cared-for beers on tap what the whistles of aging squatters and recently arrived lifelong students | Danckelmannstraße 43
- 13. Evelyn's Hundesaalon "Snobby Dogs"** | The dressing tables are right in the display window – worth seeing the poodle make-overs | Sophie-Charlotten-Straße 36
- 14. Restaurant Pinselheinrich** | The famous Berlin illustrator and photographer Heinrich Zille lived in this house for almost 40 years, until his death | Sophie-Charlotten-Straße 88
